The First "Cross and Compass" by Bill Herbert

I met PGK Joe Clemens in 1980 when he and several others were out beating the bushes in Federal Way to find potential K of C members for the new Council that would become #7528. He had obtained a list of local Knights who were members of out-of-thearea Councils. At that time I belonged to the 2,000-member #3660 in Indianapolis, having been a recent transplant to the Pacific Northwest. Joe, who lived nearby, knocked on my door, and before long I was signing up to transfer to the St. Vincent group. While I had been very active with the K of C in Indy, I had other irons in the fire out here and had no intentions of doing much more than paying dues. Joe, however, had other ideas. He knew that I was already editing newsletters for two other organizations, but we both also knew that a new group such as this could sink or float based on the quality and quantity of communications. He conned me into getting a newsletter started for the new Council, but I only committed for one year. Joe can be very persuasive! Now that we had a "drafted" Editor, we needed a name for the rag. That was easy ... we merely stole "The Cross and Compass" from the Indy newsletter! Actually, we requested and received permission to use the name and associated logo/artwork. The Supreme Council provided some "clip art" for paste-ups (this is prior to desktop publishing), and we were off and running. I was Editor for about a year, and then turned it over to a successor who improved on the original product. Now that I'm recently retired, and after 40+ years in the Knights, I'm planning to become more active again, but NOT as a newsletter Editor!""
